General Trends

- Highway congestion will intensify
- More efficient truck configurations = Productivity gains
- Greater truck weights, more axles

General Trends

- Rail intermodal traffic will grow in major corridors
- Mergers of Eastern & Western roads = more Michigan intermodal traffic shifts to rail
- High fuel costs + driver shortages = larger deliveries, more emergency stock on hand

Ride Hailing Business Model - Uber/Lyft <u>Uber</u>


- Just entering the market in Region 8


Model targets urban areasAlso includes less dense rural areas

MDOT Office of Passenger Transportation

- Studying the ability of providers to cross jurisdictional boundaries
- Statewide study to identify gaps in service areas

- Two counties studying provision of transit relative to need & assets available
 - Calhoun County
 - Berrien County

Calhoun County

- Understand best option for a county-wide system
- What would be the cost?
- How would it be governed and managed?
- How would Battle Creek Transit fold into the county-wide system?
- Currently services are provided by:
 - City of Marshall
 - City of Battle Creek

Berrien County

- Studying consolidation of four systems into a single county-wide authority
- How exactly would services be provided in the new model?
- How can transit more seamlessly blend with other modes
 - Non-motorized, rail, ride hailing services, senior transport, etc...

<u>Kalamazoo</u>

- Kalamazoo Area Transportation Study (KATS) KATS Moves Plan
- Find locations for new pedestrian, bicycle, & greenway facilities
- Identify connections between new & existing nonmotorized facilities and the Kalamazoo Metro Transit (Kmetro) network

Public/Private Partnerships

Hope Network, Wheels to Work

- Focused on connecting workers to jobs
- Nominal fee for transportation to & from employers
- Employer & employee share cost
- Employee portion deducted from paycheck
 - Some employers will pay entire fee until the first paycheck received
- Hope bills employers for their total usage

Public/Private Partnerships

Hope Network, Wheels to Work

- Began in Grand Rapids
- Looking to expand geographic reach & modify the model
- Want to explore a sustainable service in less dense areas

Model essentials:

- Use existing assets
- Hope handles vehicles, dispatch, coordination
- A single contact number for all participants

Industrial Collaborative

- Lake Michigan College (Ken Flowers, Dean -Career & Workforce Ed)
- Transportation is THE major obstacle
 - For students to complete their programs of study
 - For successful job placement and retention
- No singular solution (they understand this)
- Higher functioning public transit is vital but other modes and options are critical

- Critical areas of improvement required
- Digital mapping for navigation & localization
- Developments in the insurance industry for addressing automation

Between 2017 and 2022

- Advances in freight platooning
- More vehicles with adaptive cruise control

Autonomous Vehicles

University of Michigan Expert Forecast

Between 2017 and 2022

- Advances in freight platooning
- More vehicles with adaptive cruise control
- Intro of automated ped zone shuttle vehicles
 - Safely manage through ped zones at low speeds
 - Projected to be 2X safer than human drivers
 - Shuttles will pioneer testing of maneuvers at low speeds in urban settings

Autonomous Vehicles

<u>University of Michigan Expert Forecast</u> By 2025

- Urban self-driving systems
- New OEM will begin
- OEMs will take on responsibility for insurance of vehicles
- Dedicated lanes in a city center
- Automobiles will transition to electric, automated, connected
- Enable more sustainable & economically efficient use of existing road infrastructure



<u>Amtrak</u>

- Positive Train Control (PTC) likely implemented before 12/2018
- Train speeds up to 110 mph
- Overall time savings of approx. 30 minutes

Passenger Rail

<u>Amtrak</u>

- 2017 TIGER application
- \$56.5M (plus 20% match from State)
- Connect Pere Marquette to Blue Water & Wolverine
- All three routes could stop in New Buffalo
- Double-track between Niles and Dowagiac
- Trains then able to pass at up to 110 mph
- Trip times reduced by an average of 12 minutes
